





It was always a day for the kids, with simple things like bicycle parades, trampolines, pony rides & paddlewheeler rides. adults had their fun, with a Scottish Highland band, casino games and tug-of-war contests between the neighboring enclaves.

Then there was the street dance. For six previous years it was held in the great open space of Leg-in-Boot Square. Over 200 people would come to dance off the beer as fast as they drank it, under the stars, with a fresh breeze off the water.

This year it was held in the Community Centre and you had to buy tickets to get in. False Creek's own Caroline Lee and Friends rocked the dance floor 'til 1:00 in the morning. Only about fifty people could be counted at any given time, but it was a good time.

It continued to rain outside, and noone spoke of the way it used to be.




