RENEWED PLAYGROUND COMING UP

Unlike the other city playgrounds yellow-taped in COVID-19 bondage, the fence that completely encircles the playground north of the school is there for a different reason. Almost the entire playground is being replaced with new equipment.

Built in the mid 70's along with the brand new False Creek community, the old then state-of-the-art climbing structures resulted in possibly the first "destination playground" within the city. Children of regular visitors to Granville Island often begged their parents for a final stop at Charleson Park before heading home.

Last month, all the original structures were removed. Remaining is one set of climbing bars that post-date the 70's. Also left intact are the more recent teeter-totter/sea saw (that school kids named The Thing) and sandpit nearby. The newly-equipped playground is expected to open in late August.
